USEFUL INFORMATION:

Currency: Guernsey has its own currency but sterling is accepted in the Channel Islands. Some places accept Euros. A bureau de change is available at the Guernsey Information Centre, Thomas Cook in St Peter Port, Condor Ferries at the harbour terminal and most High Street banks, during normal opening hours.

Sunday trading: Guernsey still celebrates a 'traditional' Sunday with most shops remaining closed.

Getting around: The Bus Terminus is situated at South Esplanade. Visit the kiosk or go to buses.gg for full details of the island's network. There are two taxi ranks in St Peter Port, at each end of the main town area. One in Church Square and one at the bottom of Le Pollet, near the SeaGuernsey mast.

From its cobbled streets to its picturesque waterfront marina, it's easy to see why St Peter Port is considered one of Europe's prettiest harbour towns.

In the 18th and 19th centuries, the port town was a shipbuilding centre and main route for trade coming in and out of the UK. Barrier stones still mark out the limits of the ancient Medieval town. Today it is a thriving town full of boutiques and gift shops, cafes and restaurants that perfectly capture both our French and British roots.

The following attractions have all been independently assessed by the Visitor Attraction Quality Assurance Scheme (VQAQAS). Look out for the Quality Assured badges, indicating businesses that currently meet or exceed our minimum approved standards.



Castle Cornet and museums
A castle that has stood guard over St Peter Port harbour since the 13th Century. Features five museums telling the story of the castle and Guernsey's military and maritime history. Daily guided tour, firing of the noon-day gun and Living History performances. Cafe and gift shop included.



Hauteville House (Maison de Victor Hugo)
A well-preserved museum reflecting the eccentricities of this great writer, who lived here in exile in Guernsey from 1836 – 1870.



Guernsey Museum at Candie
A permanent exhibition telling the story of the islands and their people. Also features a changing programme of exhibitions, children's discovery room, cafe and gift shop.



La Vallette Underground Military Museum
Military museum covering all aspects of Guernsey's history. Housed in a WW2 German tunnel complex.



National Trust of Guernsey Victorian Shop and Parlour
The oldest remaining complete building within the town's Medieval boundaries now restored by the National Trust as a Victorian sweet shop. Limited opening.



Guernsey Tapestry
Guernsey's history depicted in 10 embroidered panels. Produced by local people to mark the millennium.



Our floral capital

St Peter Port is the proud RHS Britain in Bloom 2014 Gold and overall winner of best coastal town. As well as the stunning displays in and around the capital, there are a number of formal gardens, all within walking distance of the High Street.



Candle Gardens
This restored Victorian oasis, featuring sweeping lawns and shaded pathways, is just a short stroll from the town centre. The lower gardens provide a rare example of a late 19th century public flower garden, whilst two late 18th century greenhouses are the oldest known heated examples in the British Isles. Stunning views across to neighbouring islands. On regular Sundays throughout the summer months, open air concerts are held.



Castle Cornet Gardens
The 800 year old castle houses four period gardens that have been created through the ages. The 16th century Suter's Garden was a vital source of herbs and vegetables and its pleasure haven of tranquillity. Sir John Lambert, imprisoned in the castle for his part in the English Civil War, grew a medicinal herb garden and the 18th century Governor's Garden is an elegant tapestry of colour, while the Master Gunner's Garden would once have been used to grow food and house animals. Many other areas around the castle have also been planted up in deference to the salty conditions and temperamental weather.

Victor Hugo's garden
The gardens of Victor Hugo's exile home have been faithfully renovated by the City of Paris and include fruit trees and Hugo's United States of Europe Oak – a living link with this famous French author. Seasonal opening.



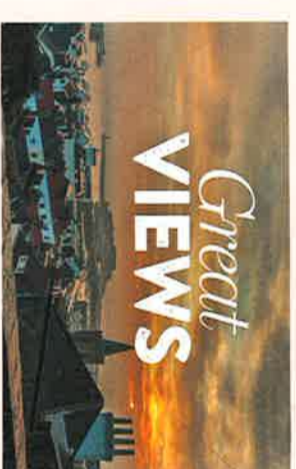
Blanchell Woods
In Springtime, the woodland floor becomes a carpet of blue beneath a tree canopy. Walk towards La Vallette bathing pools and climb the steps to Clarence Battery, then follow the cliff path that winds around the coastline.

For the family

Guernsey Aquarium
Wide variety of fish from local waters and further afield. Also lizards, frogs and Terrapin Island.



The Skatepark
This state-of-the-art facility at Cambridge Park, on the outskirts of St Peter Port, was opened in May 2013.



Clifton
Climb up the historic Arcade Steps in the Commercial Arcade and you are rewarded with stunning views.



Clarence Battery
Built in 1780, these are the remains of Fort George, the island's principle fort during the French Revolution and home of the German Luftwaffe early warning service during WW2.

Mignot Plateau
At the top of Cornet Street is St Barnabus, formerly a Church and now an archive centre. Views from the adjacent car park are some of the best in St Peter Port.



Castle Emplacement
Beyond Castle Cornet is a long walkway that leads out to a lighthouse at the end. This popular fishing spot offers lovely views back to St Peter Port and across our sister islands.

Les Cotils
12 acres of beautiful gardens. Enjoy the stunning views across St Peter Port and our neighbouring islands of Herm, Sark and Alderney.

Tasty Walks is a series of 12 self-guided trails in Guernsey, Herm, Sark and Alderney which make the most of the very best the islands have to offer – its stunning scenery and fabulous food. Each has an audio guide. Tasty Walks features three St Peter Port walks for you to enjoy at your own pace.
